

## <u>Geography</u> <u>Intent Implementation Impact Statement</u>

## Intent

We value the importance of geography in supporting children to understand the world that we live in. Within the geography curriculum, our intent is to engage, enthuse and develop children's curiosity and fascination about the world around them. To promote their interest in the places, people, resources, and the natural and human environments that are around us. We aim to provide a curriculum that covers all the subject knowledge, skills and understanding as set out in the National Curriculum. The curriculum is carefully planned to ensure progression from EYFS up to the end of KS2. Meaningful links with other subjects are made to strengthen these connections and understanding.

## *Implementation*

As a school, the teaching and implementation of our geography Curriculum maintains strong links to the guidelines set out within the National Curriculum. Our curriculum is taught on a two-year-cycle (Year 1 and 2) and within phases (KS1, LKS2 and UKS2). Our specialist mixed KS classes follow a 4-year-cycle. We teach a range of units selected from the International Primary Curriculum (IPC) which are carefully planned to deliver a relevant and engaging curriculum content, where all learning is built upon prior knowledge. Children are taught at the KS prior to the one that are in to ensure the units are differentiated to be appropriate and accessible. Our children have the opportunity to engage in practical lessons and to make visits nearby to develop their understanding of our local area. Staff will model subject-specific vocabulary, knowledge and skills to encourage the transference of these skills to the children.

## Impact

We measure the impact of our curriculum through a variety of methods. Children will be engaged in lessons where geography is being taught and will be able to answer questions to demonstrate and recall their learning and ask questions to further their geographical knowledge. Children's work is of a good quality and demonstrates that geography is taught at an age-appropriate level across the school. Teachers will use the marking of work to inform future lessons, ensuring that children are adequately supported and challenged, and any misconceptions are addressed. The children's learning is consolidated into End of Year reports for parents/carers where they can see what the children have covered and what they have enjoyed. The impact of the geography curriculum is also monitored and measured during informal learning walks and formal lesson observations.
